Lesson 1 What is Evangelism?

As we seek to understand the true nature of evangelism, it will be helpful to examine a number of biblical words.

To Evangelize (euangelizomai)

This verb is used 52 times in the New Testament, including 25 by Luke and 21 by Paul. Its essential meaning is to announce or proclaim Good News. (Luke 4:18; 8:1; Acts 8:12; 10:36)

The Gospel (euangelion)

This noun occurs 72 times in the New Testament, 54 of which come in Paul's writings.

The notion that since Jesus died upon the cross all men are automatically forgiven cannot be squared with the biblical insistence upon a wholehearted personal response to the Gospel. (Rom. 1:16)

To Proclaim (kerussein)

This verb is used as commonly as the verb "to evangelize," appearing 61 times in the New Testament. The underlying picture is that of a herald or town crier who sounds the trumpet and conveys the news from the king. The herald is not to express his opinions or ideas, but to deliver his message in the humility of heart that must accompany such authority of speech.

The Message/Proclamation (kerugma)

This word is used interchangeably with "the Gospel." Consider Romans 16:25.

When Paul addressed the Corinthians, he distinguished himself from the flowery rhetoric that marked so many teachers. His "message and his kerugma" were different. (1 Cor. 2:4)



Lesson 3 Understanding Our Message

John Stott, in his book, *Our Guilty Silence*, suggests that one of the main reasons for our silence is because we lack either a thorough knowledge of the Gospel or a conviction about its truth or both. There can be no evangelism without an evangelist, no mission without a message. ⁴


